In English we can:

Write setting descriptions using a variety of sentence structures.
Write a persuasive speech.
Write a diary entry.
Infer information from the text.
Develop our reading and comprehension

In Maths we can:

Identify, compare and order numbers up to one million.

Add and subtract numbers with more than four digits.

Use rounding to check our own answers for accuracy.

Solve calculations involving negative numbers.

In RE we can:

Discuss what it means to 'inspire' somebody and identify what makes a leader inspirational.

Recognise inspirational leaders in history, including famous Americans such as Martin Luther King.

Make connections with global religious leaders and identify the impact that they have had in inspiring others.
